Airpower Effects

The Coalition continues to systematically engage military targets including the Da'esh command, transport and logistical network and other critical targets with precision airstrikes to disrupt their capabilities to function. November's airpower summary reflects precision engagements against Da'esh, dismantling and isolating its fighters in their largest remaining strongholds.

In Operation Inherent Resolve, the Coalition continues to support air operations in both Iraq and Syria to support our partnered ground forces. Iraqi Security Forces continue to make deliberate progress in their advance on Mosul with the support of Coalition airpower. At the request of the Government of Iraq, the Coalition disabled four of the five bridges connecting east and west Mosul, and increased terrain-denial missions. The intent of these operations is to reduce the effectiveness of vehicle-borne improved explosive devices – a cornerstone tactic Da'esh employs against Coalition forces. Da'esh fighters are now surrounded by superior force, with little ability to resupply or reinforce their fighters. In Syria, the Syrian Democratic Forces have recaptured well over 700 square kilometers of terrain from Da'esh, and now continue planning the next phase of the isolation of Raqqah. The Coalition continues to support their operations with airstrikes, having delivered more than 600 munitions onto enemy targets in Da'esh's self-proclaimed capital.

In Operation Resolute Support and Freedom's Sentinel, the Afghan Air Force has grown its capabilities for aircraft and weapons maintenance. During November, AAF maintainers completed the first 600-hour aircraft inspection in country, including the post-inspection engine run, on an A-29 Super Tucano. This inspection is a significant achievement for the maintainers as they were able to use their recent qualifications to complete the maintenance with minimal contractor assistance. Maintenance graduates from initial A-29 training at Moody Air Force Base, Ga., worked together with their U.S. Air Force advisors and contractor trainers to gain critical skills to maintain and employ the A-29, which has become a critical platform for close air support in combat operations. Additionally, safety advisors from Train, Advise, Assist Command-Air (TAAC-Air) completed a site survey of AAF munition storage in Mazer-e-Sharif in order to plan future construction of a munitions field depot. The construction will include a bomb building facility, weapons storage facilities, and a loading area for aircraft. The depot will increase capabilities and allow the AAF to take lead on maintaining and storing bombs and rockets, which is the next step in advancing the AAF's ability to take the fight to the enemy.

Airpower will continue to play a key role in developing a sustainable way ahead for Iraq and Syria since the fall of Mosul and Raqqah will not in itself defeat the terrorist organization. The Coalition remains vigilant in its pursuit to eliminate resources that enable Da'esh to continue its efforts of terror within the region and around the world.
