

Airpower Effects

As of 30 September 2016

The Coalition's persistent air coverage continues to impact Da'esh's ability to fight and conduct operations in Iraq, Syria and Afghanistan. September's airpower summary demonstrates how the Air Coalition continues to use the complement of airpower available to deliver destruction to Da'esh's command and control, removing tools of terror from the battlefield.

Through Operation Freedom's Sentinel, U.S. airpower provides a vital contribution to the overall campaign. Air strikes continue to enable the success of U.S. and Government of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan counter-insurgency operations across Afghanistan as well as providing round-the-clock protection for ground forces. Aerial refueling, Intelligence, as well as Surveillance and Reconnaissance sorties provide critical support to the operations. Resolute Support will continue to train, advise and assist the Afghan government as they take the lead for security in Afghanistan. The Afghan Air Force has been able to maintain a retention rate around 94% and has approximately 70 aircrews, which is expected to continue to grow. A class of 195 Afghans graduated from Pohantoon-e-Hawayee, or Air University, on Sept. 1, 2016. The students, who are now commissioned lieutenants in the AAF, spent a year learning English, leadership and general aviation studies.

In Operation Inherent Resolve, the Air Coalition continues to apply persistent pressure against Da'esh to exhaust their ability to function and sustain operations across the area of operations. In September, the Air Coalition successfully conducted nearly 1,782 combat strike sorties and more than 4,981 total sorties during operations against Da'esh. Intelligence indicated that Da'esh had converted a pharmaceutical plant complex into a chemical weapons production capability. A strike package of 12 aircraft, to include U.S. F-15Es, A-10s, B-52s, F-16s and Marine Corps F-18s, destroyed more than 50 points of interest in Mosul, removing a significant chemical threat to Iraqis. In addition, the Air Coalition used U.S. F-16s and A-10s to destroyed a convoy of 42 oil tanker trucks in Raqqa. With a significant portion of Da'esh's financing resulting from oil revenue, the use of deliberate targeting and precision airstrikes will continue to disrupt their ability to generate revenue.

Each nation's unique capabilities allow for a flexibility in airpower that Da'esh is not able to overcome. With the precision application of Coalition airpower and indigenous ground forces willing to stand and fight, Da'esh has been forced to abandon once successful tactics and, over time, they no longer have the capacity for large offensive action.

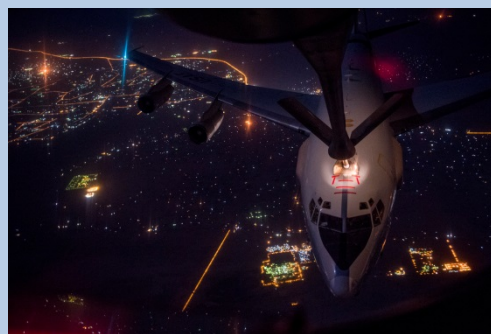
